Program Notes

Empathy. Understanding. Love. These are the descriptors of our program. By opening our hearts to feeling, we enable compassion, which facilitates the means for action.

We begin with a most honest and universal feeling, that of *Joy*, composed by Ricky Ian Gordon, most known for his work in art song and opera (*Grapes of Wrath, 2007*). All of us can emerge from this place together, having felt joy, whether we "found [joy] in the arms of" someone special, as Langston Hughes writes, or in some other capacity. This seedling of joy is our common ground.

The next two pieces explore a deeper adoration – one introspective offering for the church, one outward praise for the concert hall. Sister Juana Inés de la Cruz, a 17th century poet, composer, philosopher, writer, and nun, is considered by some as the "Hildegard of Mexico." Her Madre, la de los primores is a lengthy, six verse motet that stands as a personal and prayerful expression of gratitude. [This audience should know that our 2-verse edition is for SSAB – a practical voicing for many choirs even today.] By contrast, we pair this with a short movement from W. A. Mozart's Great Mass in C minor, which, like the Requiem, was left unfinished at the time of his passing. This Gloria, written in Classical Italian style, has cadential moments that resound the spirit of Handel. While vocally acrobatic, it equally serves as an expression of the composer's faith.

Our program is crafted in a 7-piece arch form; its keystone is *A Prayer of Compassion*. Composed in 2018 after one of the many newsworthy tragedies in our collective experience, Gwyneth Walker stitched together a text that spoke the feelings of her heart. Walker writes,

This prayer combines traditional texts (Psalms 4:8 and 5:8) with the closing lines of John Greenleaf Whittier's poem "Divine Compassion." The biblical passages ask for the Lord's guidance that we may walk in the paths of peace. Extending the supplication, the poignant Whittier lines ask for human compassion:

Let me keep a heart that still can feel, and eyes that still can weep. In today's world of increasing violence, and increasing global awareness of atrocities, we are often challenged to remain sensitive to suffering, to respond with a heart that still can feel, and eyes that still can weep."

It is our hope that we never become numb. Sometimes, to feel is a choice, and one we hope to keep making. To stay in touch with our feelings invites greater empathy, which provides the catalyst for change.

One perspective that pleads for empathy is the honest *Say Her Name* by Alysia Lee. This piece engages the choir and audience in a Kwanzaa libation ceremony – a tradition that invites a family or group to honor a moment of silence, then call out names of departed ancestors. Lee writes, "Names are powerful. As the names are called, memories and stories fill the room. Love fills the room." It is in the spirit of love that we sing *Say Her Name*. Various chorus members have selected the names spoken in this piece. Kimberlé Crenshaw, a central leader of the #SayHerName movement has shared, "If you say the name, you're prompted to learn the story, and if you know the story, then you have a broader sense of [empathy]."

The final two pieces inspire human resolve – the first envisions reform, the second embodies a more specific call to action. In *Somewhere*, words and music are equally powerful partners. Sondheim's text, "Hold my hand, and we're halfway there" outwardly admits that this goal is not complete; the message is emphasized by the repeated words, "Someday, Somehow, Somewhere." Bernstein's incessant use of the tritone musically suggests that this plea, while noble, is unattainable. We, the performers, however, are unsatisfied with that impasse. Our programmatic journey embraces that tritone shift, the farthest possible tonal displacement, with the opening chords of *Cantate Canticum Novum*. The choir comes full circle, back to joy, and declares in macaronic verse and aggregate solidarity, "Joyfully sing, Sing a new song, Till all are filled with love."

Peter Steenblik
Director of Choral
Activities

Dr. Peter Steenblik is Director of Choral Activities at the University of West Florida, and Artistic Director of the Choral Society of Pensacola. Previous appointments include Chorus Master for the Pensacola Opera, director of Women's Chorus at the University of North Texas, and director of choirs at Jordan High School (Salt Lake City). He holds degrees in conducting, vocal pedagogy, and music education from the University of North Texas, and the University of Utah, respectively.

Steenblik is the most recent recipient of the Service Award from the Florida Vocal Association, recognizing his work in the state and beyond. An active presenter, adjudicator, and clinician, recent appearances have included the Chengdu Children's Choir Festival. the Xi'an International Choral Festival, the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute, various ACDA Division Conferences, the Florida Vocal Association State MPA and Summer Convention, Florida Music Educators Association Conference, the Festival Singers of Florida tour to Indonesia, the Utah Music Educators Association State Festival, and ACDA state conferences in Florida, Georgia, and Utah. He has served as the head of choral activities for the Utah Music Educators Association and on the Utah ACDA board as R & S Chair for Men's Choruses. He has conducted various honor choirs in Utah, Alabama, and Tennessee, and will be conducting the 2023 Florida All-state Reading Chorus. Additional collaborations include the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, Utah Symphony, Ballet West, Women's Chorus of Dallas, Pensacola Opera, and Pensacola Symphony Orchestra.



Hyunjoo KimCollaborative Pianist

Hyunjoo Kim is a staff pianist for the Grier Williams School of Music and collaborative pianist for the UWF Singers. She is the organist/pianist at Trinity Presbyterian Church in Pensacola, and the collaborative pianist for the Choral Society of Pensacola.

She holds a master's degree in organ performance from Hanyang University, Seoul, Korea. She holds a bachelor's degree in music from the Catholic University of Korea. While seeking her degrees, she served as an organist at a Presbyterian church in Korea.

Hyunjoo has served as the organist for the UWF Commencement and organist at St. Mark Methodist Church in Pensacola. Prior to coming to Florida, she served as a pianist at Lake Forest Baptist Church in Gainesville, FL, and an organist at Jesus Community Church in San Diego, CA. She has been a member of the American Guild of Organists since 2015.

- Friday, December 9, 2022
- Friday, February 17, 2023
- Friday, May 5, 2023 (last audition date for transfer students for Fall 2023 acceptance)

Priority scholarship deadline is December 1, 2022 for the University-sponsored scholarships, and March 31, 2023 for the WSOM-sponsored scholarships. To be eligible, students must have their university application and WSOM audition completed.
